Singing, Teaching, Confessing

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.
-Colossians 3:16-17 7:14

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

You might have realized by now that I love the Church's hymnody. Whether I am in tune or out of tune, good or bad, perfect or horribly of pitch, I'm going to sing and I'm going to sing loud. I love to sing with the Church and I love to hear the Church sing and make a joyful noise to the Lord. The value and usefulness of music and hymnody have been important to me and played a significant role in the Reformation, as well. Luther was a prolific hymn writer among all the other things he did and wrote. There have been other famous Lutheran musicians and hymn writers since Luther such as George Handel (who composed Handel's Messiah), Johann Sebastian Bach, Dietrich Buxtehude, Johannes Brahms, Felix Mendelssohn, Philipp Nicolai, Paul Gerhardt, and the list goes on (sorry if I missed your favorite) even to the modern day.

This is not by accident or coincidence. The Lutheran church has, from its beginning, valued and used music along with theology. Luther is famously quoted saying, "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise. The gift of language combined with the gift of song was given to man that he should proclaim the Word of God through music." So the use of music throughout the Lutheran liturgy and the explosion of Lutheran hymnody took off and continues to "proclaim the Word of God."

Singing the faith, our hymnody, is more than just entertainment, but it is theology. In it we confess and teach the faith. Different professors or teachers I have had attribute different things to our music, one saying that "it is a sung confession of the faith" and another that it is "a sermon from the past," yet another that "our hymnody is an extension of the sermon."

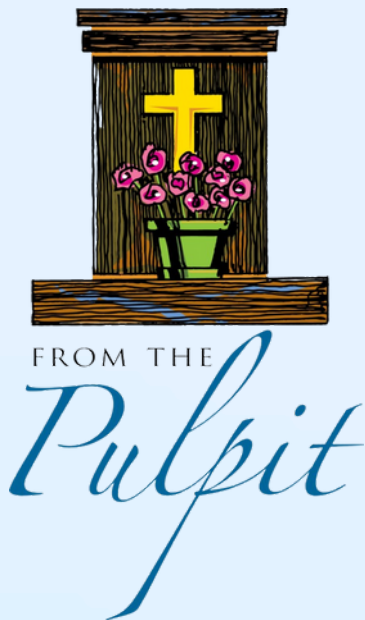
Perhaps one of the greatest and most unique uses of music in general is not only that it has the ability to move our emotions and our bodies, but that music plays a foundational role in teaching and learning. We learn our "ABCs" by singing. Maybe you learned the books of the Bible or the Presidents by singing. The combination of a text and tune married perfectly together have a way of sticking in your head long after the song is over.

So, we are going to take advantage of the way music and hymnody teach the faith by using a "Hymn of the Month/Season." Our Sunday school began this at the beginning of this year, singing and learning a new hymn each month. Now, our church, together with our Sunday school, will learn a hymn together as we will sing the same hymn each Sunday, similar to what we have done for our Advent and Lent midweek services.

I will be choosing one hymn each month (or season of the Church Year) that I hope ties together all the readings and applies to each Sunday it will be used. Some hymns will be favorites that we know and love. Others will be newer hymns that we will learn and have the chance to hear how they preach the Gospel to us.

Our first hymn will be "At the Name of Jesus" (LSB 512) which teaches, preaches, and proclaims Christ, the Word from the beginning, at creation, incarnation, atoning death and resurrection, ascension, and with us now until He returns again in glory.

NATIONAL BLOOD DONOR MONTH

Since 1970, January has been designated as a month to honor and celebrate the incredible generosity of America's volunteer blood donors. The designation came at a time when the need for safe, reliable blood donations was becoming increasingly important for modern medical care.

January was chosen as the month to celebrate blood donors because winter is traditionally a time when blood donations decline due to weather conditions, holiday travel, and seasonal illnesses. By focusing national attention on blood donation during this challenging time, organizers hoped to encourage more people to donate when the need was greatest.

The initiative was born from the recognition that volunteer blood donors are the sole source of life-saving blood products. According to the World Health Organization, "blood is the most precious gift that anyone can give to another person- the gift of life. A decision to donate your blood can save a life, or even several if your blood is separated into its components. Unlike many medical treatments that can be

manufactured or synthesized, blood can only come from generous human donors willing to help their fellow Americans in times of medical crisis.

More than 50 years after its establishment, National Blood Donor Month continues to play a vital role in America's healthcare system. Every January the heroes who roll up their sleeves to save lives are celebrated.

The annual blood donations needed exceeds 6.8 million and there are over 13.6 million donors who give annually. According to the American Red Cross, about 38 percent of the U.S. population can donate blood but only 10 percent actually do. Every 2 seconds in America someone needs blood.

If you are a blood donor we celebrate you! If not maybe consider becoming a donor. With your help you can ensure there's blood on the shelf when it's most needed. Every time we donate one pint of blood, there is the potential is to save three lives.

JANUARY WORLD WATCH LIST COUNTRIES

Uzbekistan

Uzbekistan is a former soviet state, and it's still ruled by an authoritarian government that heavily monitors the population, especially religious groups. A country expert shared that in one part of Uzbekistan, “every pastor and his family were surveilled by about 30 people. Practically every step was watched.”

The historic Russian Orthodox churches experience the least persecution from the government, but they are not permitted to share their faith with the rest of the Uzbek population. All other Christian communities face some sort of monitoring and pressure. Churches that are not approved of and registered by the state are often raided by the police, with people arrested, threatened and fined for having an illegal meeting.

The vast majority of people in Uzbekistan are Muslim, and new Christian believers from Muslim families bear the brunt of persecution—from both the state and also from their own families and communities. It's perceived as a betrayal to leave Islam and brings great shame on the family. These new believers may be threatened, locked away, divorced, disowned or physically abused.

- As the government continues to target Christians and churches for abuse, ask God to help them to persevere and be witnesses to Christ's love.
- Pray that unregistered churches will not be targeted or harassed by authorities.
- Ask God to be with converts from Islam, who can experience pressure from their families and communities.

Cuba

Since 1959, Cuba has been ruled by the Communist Party, which tries to control the church. The government reacts harshly to anyone who opposes it. Church leaders and Christian activists who criticize the regime can face interrogation, arrest and imprisonment. They also suffer smear campaigns, travel restrictions, and harassment (which can include physical violence and damage to church buildings).

These leaders' family members also face threats, including losing custody of their children. The government often refuses to register new churches, forcing many to operate illegally. These churches are vulnerable to fines, property confiscation and even demolition.

- Pray for church leaders in Cuba who can be targeted for surveillance and abuse from state authorities. Ask God to provide strength and wisdom.
- Pray that all churches – both registered and unregistered – will be allowed to remain open. Pray that authorities who monitor these churches will be touched by the message they hear.
- Ask God to provide strength and encouragement to Cuban believers as they walk with Him despite the pressure.
