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Signs and Symbols of Lenten Salvation

And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a fiery serpent and set it on a pole, and everyone who is bitten, when he sees it, shall live." So Moses made a bronze serpent and set it on a pole.

And if a serpent bit anyone, he would look at the bronze serpent and live.

-Numbers 21:8-9

Redeemed and Saved Saints,

You may know well the verse of John 3:16, sometimes described as the "Gospel in a nutshell." Giving context for the popular verse, the previous two verses of John (3:14-15) refer to the above quoted events when Israel was in the wilderness. The people spoke against Moses and against God, so God sent them fiery serpents to call them to repentance and faith, unfortunately, killing at least some of them in the process. In the above verses, God gives an antidote, a way of salvation for those bitten and infected with the venom of the serpent, to look at their sin upon a pole that they might live. Of course, it worked, and all who believed this saving word, looked at the serpent, lived.

The Bible is full of these signs of salvation. The bow (or rainbow) that God placed in the sky after the flood, the sign that a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, all the way to the sign of the cross, serve as signs of our salvation. The Bible forbids us from making idols and carved images to worship, but it, along with the Church, both before and after Christ, is full of signs, pictures, artwork, and depictions that remind us of the salvation of our God.

The current, modern Church is no different. We decorate the church with pictures, artwork, and even stained glass that often tell the story of our salvation. During Advent, we considered several decorations, signs, and symbols of the Church, used by the world, in which the Christmas story and that of our salvation is proclaimed. Just like we have signs and symbols that lead us to the manger in Advent, we have certain signs and symbols during the season of Lent that lead us to the cross.

Many of them are not as popular. Some of them are hard to look at, hard to hear or think about, but this Lenten season, we are going to focus on different signs of Lent. These are more than just props, but items that remind us of the story of our salvation, remind us of the Passion of our Lord, remind us of what was necessary for our Lord to suffer in order to save us. That's probably why they are not as popular as the Christmas Tree, the star and Christmas lights, and adorable little angels that are scattered throughout town during December. These are hard, in many cases bloody, symbols that remind us of the suffering of Christ for us.

Ash Wednesday will, of course, focus on the ashes that are placed upon our forehead, recalling that all of this is necessary because of our sin, what we have done and left undone, because we sinners who will die and return to the dust are in need of the cross for our salvation. On His way to the cross, our God was bound with either ropes or shackles (2/25), flogged with a Roman Flagrum (3/4), clothed with a purple robe (3/11), crowned with thorns (3/18), pierced with nails (3/25) and spear (4/2), and crucified to death on a cross (4/3).

These tools (and sermons) will likely, even hopefully, make you a little uncomfortable. Like the movie "The Passion of the Christ," they will not be rated "G" though won't be anything I am not prepared for my own children to hear also. The intent is not to scandalize you, but walk you through what your God willingly, even gladly, endured that He might accomplish your salvation, and I look forward to walking with you to our Lord's cross and empty tomb.

FEBRUARY IS AMERICAN HEART MONTH

Did you know about 2,200 Americans die each day from heart disease? That's about one in 40 seconds.

Cardiovascular diseases claim more lives than all forms of cancer combined.

Cardiovascular disease is the No. 1 killer of women, taking about 1 in 3 lives. Yet only about 44% of women in the U.S. believe the disease is their greatest health threat.

American Heart Month is an excellent time to teach you that cardiovascular disease can often be prevented by making healthy choices and properly managing your health conditions.

Cardiovascular disease affects the blood vessels and cardiovascular system. Numerous problems can result from this, many of which are related to a process called atherosclerosis, a condition that develops when plaque builds up in the walls of the arteries. This buildup narrows the arteries, making it harder for blood to flow through. If a blood clot forms, it can stop the blood flow. This can cause a heart attack or stroke.

A heart attack is not always as obvious as pain in your chest, shortness of breath, and cold sweats. A heart attack can actually happen without a person knowing it. A heart attack that has either no symptoms, minimal symptoms or unrecognized symptoms is called a "silent" heart attack.

Women and their physicians may also be more likely to chalk up symptoms of a silent heart attack to stress or anxiety and dismiss them.

A silent heart attack is still like any other heart attack—there's a blockage of blood flow to a section of the heart by a build up of plaque. That blockage can cause scarring and damage to the heart muscle. Studies differ, but some suggest that silent heart attacks are more common in women than in men. It's possible for a doctor to discover a heart attack through the use of MRI or an EKG even though the person never knew the heart attack occurred.

People who have silent heart attacks are more likely to have non-specific and subtle symptoms, such as: indigestion, flu like symptoms, feeling like you strained a muscle in the chest or upper back, or discomfort in the jaw or upper back or arms.

A silent heart attack can be just as dangerous as its more obvious counterpart. Because the event often leaves scarring and damage to the heart, it put the person at greater risk of other heart problems. Since the person didn't know to seek treatment the overall impact could be greater.

Caring for your heart through a healthy diet and regular physical activity is the secret weapon to preventing heart disease. The real preventative power lies with real changes to your lifestyle—which can reduce the risk for heart disease by as much as 80 percent. Better cardiovascular health helps lower the risk for heart disease, stroke and other major health problems. (American Heart Association)

FEBRUARY WORLD WATCH LIST COUNTRIES

NORTH KOREA

North Korea is arguably the most dangerous place on earth to follow Jesus. If someone is discovered to be a Christian, the consequences are unimaginably stark: either imprisonment in one of its notorious labor camps, with little hope of release, or immediate execution. The same fate is likely to await other family members.

While the church buildings displayed in the capital Pyongyang might suggest a degree of tolerance, this is propaganda. The reality is very different. Christianity has no place in North Korea, a country where homage must be directed one way only: towards the Kim regime. With watchful eyes everywhere – even from neighbors and family – even the slightest hint of worshipping Jesus can have devastating consequences. Remarkably, believers do gather, but in utmost secrecy and at enormous risk.

Recent years have seen conditions worsen further for North Korea's secret believers. This is largely due to the 'anti-reactionary thought law', introduced in 2020, which made it even clearer that being a Christian and owning a Bible is regarded as a serious crime. The law has reinforced just how much of a threat Christianity is seen to be by the country's unbending regime.

- Pray for Kim Jong-un and his family. Ask God to change their hearts – knowing that He did the same for the Apostle Paul.
- Communities of faith in North Korea are often small gatherings of families or close friends. Pray that God would protect these beautiful expressions of His church, and that these believers would sense God's perfect peace.
- Pray for those believers in North Korea affected by a lack of food, that God would help them find the food they need. Pray that they would be given opportunities to wisely share the gospel by caring for others in similar circumstances.

SOMALIA

Christians in Somalia live in one of the harshest environments in the world, a place where openly following Jesus is impossible. In Somalia as a whole, it is illegal to convert from Islam to Christianity under the 2012 Provisional Constitution. Sharia (Islamic law) is upheld in all regions and this, coupled with social and clan pressure, forces Christians to practice their faith in secret and isolation. Conversion to a different religion is seen as betrayal and a dishonoring of country, clan and family. This can lead to violence, being disowned by family (which in clan-based Somalia leaves individuals highly vulnerable) and even execution, often by family members. Christians have no legal protection. Officials participate in or condone surveillance, harassment and intimidation – creating an environment where Christianity is criminalized.

The militant extremist group Al-Shabaab has grown in dominance in certain areas due to a worsening political and security situation that has created a leadership void. This group wishes to eradicate Christianity and openly executes anyone suspected of being a Christian.

- Somalia is one of the most dangerous places to live as a Christian. Pray that the small number of believers would find shelter and safety in the arms of Jesus.
- Al-Shabaab, the Islamic extremist group, target anyone they suspect of being Christian. Ask God to protect Christians and keep them from death or attack.
- Pray that Somali believers would know they aren't alone, even if they are forced to worship in secret.
- Somalia is traumatized, and Christian Somalis more so. Pray that God's Spirit will minister to them and that He would bring healing to their minds and spirits.
